### **District Assembly**

This is the second one of these for me, and I think I'm getting the hang of it. I took the training for Secretaries and Secretaries-Elect, and was glad that I did. DaCdb is beginning to look more and more like a resource to be used, and I'm starting to see how it all works.

President-Elect Dennis (one of the four of us from this club who attended) still isn't comfortable with it, and he asked me to update his home address on it for him. This I did upon my return, and I'm happy to assist others if requested to do so.

But that isn't the reason for my column this week. No, there's something else on my mind. While I was there, I thought I should buy a personal copy of the District 5300 Directory. After all, I reasoned, if I am selected as a Continent Leader for next year's RYLA experience, I'll need to visit clubs in our own Group 1 of the California West Region to make a recruiting pitch for Facilitators.

Buying the Directory gave me the opportunity to review it at my leisure, and I saw something on Page 6 of the District Section that I hadn't noticed before. It's the statement of the 2013-14 Governor's Goals. There are goals for Membership, The Rotary Foundation, Club Service, International Service, New Generations, and Public Relations. And then there's the top two lines, which convey the "District Governor Project," in 25 words or less—this last part being my observation only!

"Raise \$75,000 for Kathy Buckley's *No Limits Foundation* in California and Nevada, to meet the needs in auditorial, speech and language capabilities of deaf children."

Okay, I edited this slightly, because

that's what I do. But WHAT, you ask, is that? Not another word is provided to tell you about this Foundation, and I'll be the first to admit that I'd never heard of it before Saturday, April 20.

Now I'm pleased to be able to tell you about this group, because I heard the talk that Kathy Buckley gave, and I picked up the pamphlet that was made available to us at the time. Who is Buckley? She's the first hard-of-hearing comedienne in the country, and she delivered her comedy act to us after she made her serious presentation. As you might imagine, the two weren't unrelated....

No Limits was founded in 1996 by teacher Michelle Christie, who began an after school program of oral communication, socialization, and public speaking skills for children with hearing loss. Notice the word *speaking*. This is not a program to teach sign language; it's rather a program to give children the ability to really speak and be understood. With that, pretty much everything else becomes possible.

Other programs are available to fund cochlear implants and special hearing aids, but expenditures on technology alone won't mainstream a child. It takes what is called *Auditory Verbal Therapy* to take full advantage of medical advances, and that runs \$100-\$150 per hour! For middle- and lower-income families, providing all the needed support to lead children to effective speech is out of reach.

The No Limits Educational Center — presently in Culver City alone, but expanding soon to the Las Vegas area — is the only organization in the country that provides free auditory, speech, and language

services for disadvantaged hearing loss children between five and eighteen years of age. Plus, they also provide parent education, so that Mom and Dad can become their child's advocate. There are other programs in Performing Arts, Science and Technology, and college planning — more than can be explained here. [See: www.kidswithnolimits.org]

Miles Petroff, our new DG as of July 1, counts (along with his wife Teresa) Kathy Buckley as a personal friend. Like our current District Governor, his choice of a District Governor Project was borne of a personal commitment. The Assembly included a bidding segment following the presentations, and, in true Rotary spirit of Service Above Self, we did ourselves proud in District 5300. Stay tuned....

# Economic Update In the News

The combined construction of new single-family homes and apartments in March rose 7 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1,036,000 units. Single-family starts decreased 4.8 percent. Volatile multifamily starts rose 31.1 percent. Compared to the previous year, housing starts were up 46.7 percent in March. Applications for new building permits, seen as an indicator of future activity, fell 3.9 percent to an annual rate of 902,000 units.

The Mortgage Bankers Association said its seasonally adjusted composite index of mortgage applications for the week ending April 12 rose 4.8 percent. Refinancing applications increased 5 percent. Purchase volume rose 4 percent, the highest level since May 2010.

The National Association of Home Builders/Wells Fargo monthly housing market index fell two points in April to 42. An index reading below 50 indicates negative sentiment about the housing market.

Consumer prices fell 0.2 percent in March, following a 0.7 percent increase in February. Compared to March 2012, consumer prices have risen 1.5 percent. Consumer prices at the core rate — excluding volatile food and energy prices — were up 0.1 percent in March.

Industrial production at the nation's factories, mines and utilities rose 0.4 percent in March after a 1.1 percent increase in February. Compared to March 2012, industrial production has increased 1.9 percent. Capacity utilization rose to 78.5 percent in March from 78.3 percent in February.

Initial claims for unemployment benefits for the week ending April 13 rose by 4,000 to 352,000. Continuing claims for the

week ending April 6 fell by 35,000 to 3.06 million. The less volatile four-week average of claims for unemployment benefits was 361,250.

Upcoming on the economic calendar are reports on existing home sales on April 22, new home sales on April 23 and gross domestic product on April 26.

#### Insight NOW Finding Your 'IT'

Here are some tips for discovering your  $\operatorname{IT}$ :

- Get clear on your purpose. This will keep you from diverting from it.
- Share your idea, passion or special skill with others.
- When the people you've shared your IT with get excited about your idea they become your cheerleaders and can help motivate you to action.
- Create and embrace accountability to yourself and your cheerleaders.
- Remember that small victories and

well-paced steps over time will help you reach your goals.

#### Knowledge Builder Accelerate Sales with A/B Testing

A/B testing is taking two different versions of a marketing piece, such as campaign emails, direct mail, landing pages and phone scripts, and presenting each version to the same number of different customers. You then measure results to see which piece invited a better outcome. With A/B testing — also known as a split test — you can analyze email subject lines, body copy, call to action, design photos, color, the time of day you send the piece and much more.

Here are tips to consider before devising your next A/B test.

- **Start simple.** Although you could test more than two versions of a marketing piece, start with two, especially if you are new to A/B testing. Call the A the controlled version and B the version you alter.
- **Define what you're testing.** If you're testing the response rate between two landing pages, focus on one element, such as call-to-action placement. If **B** has a different call-to-action position and a different headline, how would you know which change had the most impact on results?
- Send A and B to an identical target audience. If you're targeting a certain type of customer, such as high income, your A and B audiences must fall within the same income level. Also, unless you are testing two different release times, A and B should be delivered simultaneously.
- Set your goals. Although B might have done better than A, is the response rate in accord with your defined goals? Also, remember, you can learn as much from an A/B testing failure as you can from A/B testing success.

Even in success, don't stop testing an ongoing campaign; small changes can bring about big results.
