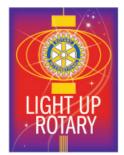

This Week ROTC Awards Guest Program Host: Tom McCurry

It's that time of the year: when we honor the top cadets in the Junior ROTC programs in the Pasadena Unified School District. ere at the Green Valley Resort where the Rotary District 5300 Conference is being held, I have seen several antique clocks. Whenever I see a fancy antique clock, I cannot help but think of the 45 + clocks and timers I have in my house, cars and garden that have to be reset twice a year. In addition to the time wasted doing this, I feel a slight twinge of guilt. As an astronomer of the pre-quarz timepiece era, I was taught to leave clocks alone — do not reset and do not trv to adjust the timing. Instead, in remote observatories, we listened to the midnight gong on the radio and noted the time difference to our clock to better than one-second accuracy. We kept track of the discrepancy and the rate of change so that we could fit a mathematical formula for a very accurate time that our telescope needed to point to the right spot in the heavens.

Thus, touching the clocks was a no-no. Designing accurate mobile clocks was one the the great inventions of the Renaissance. Clocks were necessary for navigation — the combination of known

positions of stars and accurate times allowed the ship's navigator to calculate the ship's longitude. The latitude came from the height of Polaris above the horizon. Prior to accurate clocks, ships either crept along the coastlines or their crew risked their lives — like Lief Erikson's or Christopher Columbus' — when they headed for parts unknown across the Atlantic without knowing where they were or if they could find their way back.

Ship's clocks of the 17th and 18th century allowed such accurate navigation that ships could utilize the trade winds and efficiently traverse the Atlantic in both directions.

Like in an observatory, no one was allowed to touch a ship's clock. Synchroni-Please turn to Reflections, p3

And Now a Word from the Chief



P a s a d e n a Chief of Police, Bill Reese delighted the attending Rotar-

ians by sharing some of his background, feelings about law enforcement and a few stories.

First his background, Reese was born in Pacific Grove, CA in 1929. At age 17, he decided to join the Navy Reserves but found out that he got sea sick standing on wet grass, so he decided to join the Army

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instead where he served and retired with a rank of Captain. He attended San Francisco Baptist College, Biola University, and Cal State, LA, where he received a BS in Police Science and Administration and a Masters in Public Health & Administration. He also earned an EdD in Institutional Management from Pepperdine. He then began his service in law enforcement a career which would span thirty years. After serving five years as Chief of Police, he retired from the force in 1990.

Reese has been a Rotarian since 1975 and was President of the South Pasadena club in 1981-82.

He then began to share his current feelings regarding law enforcement in the world we live in today. He shared that we are going through a transition period that is really, really rough. It is basically open season on police officers all around the country. Even his son said he wouldn't want to be an officer on the force today. Police are currently a target in the public's eye and are criticized for every little thing they do. He stated that enforcing the law has become so rigid that, for instance, if a spouse reports domestic abuse, they must arrest the accused. Officers no longer have the ability to work through the argument the couple might have been having to settle things without having to put someone in jail.

Reese then shared a story that occurred during his time on the force. He was off-duty and was at the Santa Anita

He had just won a \$5 bet and was in line at the ticket window when he noticed Robert and William Ferganchick, two brothers who had plagued Southern California and were believed to have committed over twenty armed robberies, including one in South Pasadena. What is Relay for Life?

In May 1985, Dr. Gordy Klatt walked and ran for 24 hours around a track in Tacoma, Washington, ultimately raising \$27,000 to help the American Cancer Society fight the nation's biggest health concern ... cancer. A year later, 340 supporters joined the overnight event. Since those first steps, the Relay for Life movement has grown into a worldwide phenomenon, raising nearly \$5 billion to fight cancer.

The American Cancer Society Relay for Life is the world's largest and most impactful fundraising event to end cancer. It unites communities across the globe to celebrate people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones lost, and take action to finish the fight once and for all. The Relay is an organized community fundraising walk. Events vary by location, but all events have key moments in common.

- **Survivors' Lap** all cancer survivors at the event take the first lap around the track, celebrating their victory over cancer. Caregivers are also celebrated.
- Luminaria Ceremony candles are lit inside of personalized bags and placed around the track to remember the people we have lost to cancer and

said, "Don't move." The younger brother pulled out his gun and pointed it at Bill who then stated, "If you don't want me to shoot your brother, you'd better put that gun down by the count of three." Bill got to two before William lowered his gun and surrendered. Both brothers were convicted and sent to prison in which they made a threat to kill Chief Reese if they ever got the chance. Well, they later escaped from prison but were recaptured prior to ever being able to act upon that threat. Reese received a letter from then FBI Director, J Edgar Hoover thanking him for his acts of bravery as the FBI was preparing to put the brothers on the nation's Most Wanted list the week after the arrest was made. He then went on to share how much he enjoyed participating in parade's and having all the kids waving and cheering for him as he drove or rode by, and the fulfillment he got from being able to help a mother find a missing child. Bill is a cancer survivor and has been cancer free now for twenty-three years. He has been married

to honor people who have fought cancer in the past.

• Fight Back Ceremony-this ceremony symbolizes the emotional commitment each of us can make in the fight against cancer.
