Sarah O'Brien Craft Talk Program Host: John Frykenberg

Sarah grew up in Nottingham, England and trained at London's Guildhall School of Music and Drama, and City University where she was awarded her Master's Degree.

On graduation she won a Fulbright Scholarship to pursue Advanced Studies with Eleonore Schoenfeld at the University of Southern California.

Currently a studio musician in Hollywood, Sarah has performed/recorded with numerous artists including The Electric Light Orchestra (ELO), Yanni, Celine Dion, Andrea Bocelli, Ozzie Osbourne and Whitney Houston in addition to albums, TV and film scores such as Star Trek, Naked Gun 33.3, Beverly Hills Cop III and on-screen appearances with Jim Carrey, Liza Minelli, 'Weird' Al Jankovic and others.

She is the composer of the new musical *Winds of Angkor* inspired by love letters that survived Cambodia's Killing Fields. 'Winds of Angkor' was the first Broadway-style musical ever performed in Cambodia and became the subject of a music documentary (currently in post production)

cultural attitudes toward rape and the rape culture in which we live are the most important steps we can take to combat this crippling social epidemic. And understanding the societal implications can be a powerful mechanism toward encouraging the political, environmental and social changes essential to implement this necessary evolution:

- 1 in 5 women in America has experienced attempted or consummated rape. [US Department of Justice, 2004]
- From 1995-2010, 9 percent of sexual assault victims were men (RAINN.org)
- 44 percent of American women have experienced some form of sexual violence other than rape. (Tjaden & Thoennes, 2000).
- Every 2.5 minutes someone in the US is sexually assaulted (Catalano, 2005)
- According to the US Department of Justice National Crime Victimization Survey, there are just under 300,000 victims of rape or sexual assault each year (Breiding et al., 2014).
- It is estimated that 79 percent of women who are raped are raped before the age of 25 (Tjaden & Thoennes, 2000).

This definition may include: inappropriate touching, rape, attempted rape, penetration or intercourse to which you did not agree and child molestation ["SA fact sheet," 2012]. Victims of sexual assault are:

- 3 times more likely to suffer depression
- 4 times more likely to contemplate

suicide

- 6 times more likely to suffer PTSD
- 26 times more likely to abuse drugs and have
- Mental/Behavioral Health Issues: PTSD. depression, anxiety, negative coping mechanisms such as smoking/drinking/drugs
- Physical Health Issues: physical injury, STDs, unintended pregnancy, insomnia other stress related conditions persist among sexual assault victims.
- Employment issues: lack of productivity, time off work/school, unemployment
- Increased needs: legal, mental health, medical, relocation services continue to escalate.

While sexual assault (SA) occurs at all socioeconomic levels, those with substantial financial and social support mechanisms are better equipped to manage. They are more likely to seek help, take advantage of resources and are less vulnerable to becoming impoverished or homeless as a result of their assault. Rates of re-victimization for the impoverished

and otherwise marginalized (including minorities and those with disabilities) are markedly higher.

Resources for SA include:

- The Violence Against Women Act (1994)
- Victims of Crime Act (1984)
- (State) Crime Victim Compensation Funds

• Over 1300 rape crisis centers nationally which receive federal funding.

brother, if he were not interested in social. economical, political or religious world. He would be nothing but an abstract theoretical ego.
