Raising Readers

began reading to my daughter when she was 3 months old — colorful cardboard books and soft, squeaky ones. I named objects in the pictures while she tried to chew on the corners of each page. We read as she grew, cuddling in the big, overstuffed armchair at the end of day. She cried and I shed a tear or two over E. B. White's Charlotte's Web, found wonder in Scott O'Dell's Island of the Blue Dolphins. Today, my 9-year-old daughter, a 5th grade student, is not to be found without a book in her hand, and we still share the books that we read.

Child psychologists and pediatricians say that reading to your children is as important as providing them with a balanced diet or fastening their seat belt. "Language matters for everything," says Frank R. Vellutino, PhD, director of the Child Research and Study Center at the University of New York. "You can't even interpret and appreciate cartoons in the newspaper without a grasp of analogy and metaphor." One must have facility with language in order to grasp complex ideas, problem-solve, and understand culture. Good readers can uncover a culture's collective knowledge, master information, and challenge themselves with difficult concepts and complex thoughts.

Parents can help their kids become more enthusiastic readers in two ways:

- 1) Read with them, and
- 2) Leave them alone with good books.

Read aloud to your children. A study by the National Academy of Education and the National Institute of Education Commission notes, "The single most important activity for building the knowledge required for eventual success in reading is reading aloud to children."

Your child's brain grows and develops just like the rest of the body; 50 percent of the brain develops before age 4. Reading to your child is a key way to stimulate mental growth and development. It goes beyond hearing the story. Children will naturally ask questions – "Why did the character do that?" or "What does that mean "You cannot start too early.

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends reading daily to children, beginning at six months of age.

Program Review

The Oceans are Rising!!! What will happen as Populations Shift?



Ian Finty, noceanographer and earth scientist at JPL, succinctly summed up the

changes in the oceans and seas of our planet earth that can be anticipated over the rest of the 21st century.

These changes will be driven by global

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warming that climate models predict will be 1-3 degrees centigrade. Indeed, some models predict 6 degrees centigrade. This warming trend — measured since 1880 — resulted in a 2.2-degree increase in temperature between 1880 and 1980. However, for the past 37 years the rate of warming has increased to six times what it was for the previous one hundred years.

This warming is almost exclusively the result of industrialization and the emission of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere to levels that have not existed for the past 800,000 years. These previous levels resulted from volcanic activity. Volcanoes have moderated their activity since then, but industrialization shows no sign of slowing down. At present, carbon dioxide levels are 400 parts per million and rising.

Most of the increase in thermal activity has taken place in the oceans. This has resulted in expansion of the volume of sea water which, along with the addition of fresh water from polar melting, has produced 99 percent of the increase in the volume of the oceans.

Because of this, by the year 2100, 200,000,000 people who live along the sea shore will be threatened. Between one and four trillion dollars of property will be endangered. Already the island nations of Nauru, Vanuatu, and the Seychelles are being evacuated. Shortly, these countries will no

wide program known as RYLA. The RYLA program was first held by our District 5300 in 1987. Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an intensive training program for high school juniors throughout our District 5300, in which they attend an all expense paid three-day weekend camp. The students selected are chosen for their leadership potential through a competitive interview process. Approximately 320 students, an equal number of boys and girls, all high school juniors, from high schools between Pasadena and Las Vegas, will be attending this year's RYLA event.

At the RYLA weekend camp — held this year in the mountains near Big Bear, California — professionals assist the students, already selected for their demonstration of early leadership potential, in developing those leadership skills. Through such activities as motivational speakers, team building exercises and programs that encourage the kids in *thinking outside the box*. The program teaches the students the fundamentals of leadership:

- Ethics of positive leadership,
- Importance of communications skills in

- effective leadership,
- Leadership in problem solving and
- Brainstorming, group dynamics and dealing with peer pressure, while building self-confidence and self-esteem.



Each year our Altadena Rotary Club sponsors 2 girls and 2 boys from John Muir High School to attend the event. We also select another 2 girls and 2 boys as alternates who may be able to attend if any of the primary candidates is unable to attend. Mike Zoeller and I went to Muir a couple of weeks ago to interview 9 high school juniors. These candidates were chosen for interviews by Dr. Nancy Gonzalez Heusser, a student counselor at Muir. As Mike will attest, this is a very challenging process due to the outstanding quality of the students interviewed.

In appreciation of the enormous help that she provides us each year in carrying out our RYLA program, we will also invite Dr. Nancy Gonzalez Heusser to attend the same meeting. We could not do this without Heusser's very generous assistance.
