friend of mine recently mentioned that she had enrolled at *Shaman School* ... not to become a practitioner but to learn more about a topic she'd observed from her travels around the world, yet knew little about.

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I can't say I know much about *Shamanism* myself, but last month my parents were in Nepal to visit the village of Mirge in an area that describes itself intriguingly as: "50 percent Hindu, 50 percent Buddhist and 100 percent Shaman!."

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For newer members who may not be aware, our Club and other Rotary Clubs from India and the UK are raising funds to build and equip a 15-bed hospital in the mountain community above Kathmandu. This is the minimum size that will be officially recognized by the Nepali Government and will allow medical aid and experienced medics to serve remote rural villages that until now have relied on a tiny health post (built by Rotarians) or visits from traditional healers known as witch-doctors, jumping-doctors or shamans. During last month's visit and meetings with the various Clubs involved, my parents witnessed the visit of an 80-year old shaman to the village to treat a little girl with epilepsy. He

chanted and recited mantras for an hour, burned incense and tied an amulet containing mushrooms and bones, mixed in water with live leeches around her neck. The family placed the equivalent of \$15 in rupees on a bowl of rice which he collected, and he went on his way...

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But back to Shamanism for now, and the following observations by Tom Kaczmarczyk:

for-profit program that promotes and organizes advanced mathematical education in the middle school classes of Pasadena Unified School District.

Select students are placed in advanced mathematics courses that will take them through calculus

by the end of the eighth grade. They have one hundred fifteen students now enrolled in the program, the advanced class of which are now in the ninth grade. College professors have been enjoined to participate in the program as instructors. By high school graduation, it is anticipated that the participating graduates will have the equivalent of a baccalaureate in mathematics.

The pedagogical methodology of the Math Academy consists of a defined progression of computational fluency, distributive practice, mixed review, active learning, cognitive noninterference, deliberative practice, and mastery of learning.



Rotary and RYLA



This year, the Altadena Club will be sending a total of eight Pasadena Muir High

school students to the annual Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) at Camp Cedar Crest in Running Springs, California. This is the largest number of students sponsored by our club in many years (maybe ever) and represents a big commitment by our club to this great Rotary project.

From our Rotary District 5300 website, (RYLA) is an intensive, two-and-a-half-day leadership training program for high school sophomores and juniors in District 5300 chosen for their leadership potential. In addition to the development of leadership skills, RYLA is meant to develop understanding of Rotary among youth participants and

reinforce and provide recognition for their efforts, accomplishments, skills and potential as leaders. Rotarians serve as facilitators to the students' learning and discovery, as well as role models of Rotary ideals of the Four Way Test and Service Above Self.

In case you are wondering how the Rotary RYLA came in to in 1959

when the State Government of Queensland, Australia, invited local Rotary Clubs to help plan an event to help celebrate the upcoming centennial of the state. Princess Alexandra, 1st cousin to Queen Elizabeth, who was in her early 20s at the time, was due to attend the celebrations, so activities were planned specifically for the princess's age group.

The gundoo, an aboriginal word mean-

ing "festival" or "fun together," was deemed successful with more than 300 men and women between the ages of 17 and 23 attending. Encouraged by the event's popularity with the young attendees, Rotary saw potential to create an annual youth program based on Gundoo. The governor of the then District 260, Art Brand, approved the project, and on 2 May 1960, RYLA was an official Rotary project.

Australian districts 258 and 260 established a committee together that developed the official framework of RYLA — to train youth ages 14-30 in character, leadership, personal development, and good citizenship. These guidelines helped RYLA expand to all Rotary districts in Australia and led to its approval as a Rotary International program by the RI Board at the 1971 Convention in Sydney, Australia.

Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Reserve Deputy Program

Back in the 1800s, the Sheriff would look to the community to form a posse and deputize citizens to assist him in the apprehension of horse thieves, murderers, or other criminals. Thankfully, we have thousands of full-time deputies to perform those duties today, but, in 2018, just like the 1800s, the Sheriff is looking to the community to find citizens to volunteer and help by becoming reserve deputy sheriffs.

Reserve deputies undergo the same training and background checks that full-time deputies receive. It's a year-long process, but, after graduation, reserve deputies can perform a wide array of duties and service to the community.

The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Reserve Program is one of the largest in the country, with over 600 all-volunteer sworn reserve deputy sheriffs. Last year they worked 182,000 hours keeping the citizens of Los Angeles County safe. Those 182,000 hours represent millions of dollars in savings to taxpayers.

Patrolling our communities is only one of many functions performed by reserve deputies. Lifesaving search and rescue missions are performed every week by reserves as part of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's Search and Rescue Program. Last year reserve deputy sheriffs performed 684 missions throughout the county, saving countless lives.

Another opportunity for reserve deputy sheriffs to serve is by becoming a member of the Sheriff's Department's Posse. Posse members work patrolling trails and various community events on horseback.

Reserve deputies also help solve crimes by working in many of the Sheriff's Department's detective units, such as Homicide Bureau, Narcotics Bureau, Fraud and Cyber Crime Bureau, and Special Victims Bureau. We also have reserves who ride street and off-road motorcycles for the Department.

Reserve deputies come from all walks of life and from a wide variety of professions. The common thread of all is a burning desire to give back to their community and assist their fellow citizens.

If you are interested in signing up — just like citizens did over a 150 years ago — there is a reserve deputy academy scheduled to start in February 2019.
