Boxing Day!

t his time of year I am often asked about *Boxing Day* – the national Bank Holiday in Britain that falls on December 26. Arguments abound on the origins of this celebration, which has nothing to do with the sport of Boxing!

Traditionally families and friends get together to eat up all the leftovers from Christmas Day, at a relaxed, often buffet-style meal. Baked ham is a popular Boxing Day meat and, of course, mince pies with brandy butter or a slice of Christmas cake or other dessert (such as *trifle*), are almost obligatory. It is also a big day for sports (horse-racing and soccer in particular), and more recently retail sales. However, the origins of *Boxing Day* have long been discussed and the most common explanations are as follows:

Why is it Called Boxing Day?

All the answers below are valid; so maybe it is one, or even all of them.

- The name is a reference to holiday gifts. A Christmas Box in Britain is a name for a Christmas present. Boxing Day was traditionally a day off for servants and the day when they received a Christmas Box from the master. The servants would also go home on Boxing Day to give Christmas Boxes to their families. The practice of Boxing Day was first mentioned by English Member of Parliament Samuel Pepys' diary entry from December 19, 1663, when he referred to "giving something to the boy' box against Christmas".
- 2. The name is a reference to charity



Churches on Christmas day and opened the next day – Boxing Day.

3. The name refers to a nautical tradition. Great sailing ships when setting sail would have a sealed box containing money on board for good luck. Were the voyage a success, the box was given to a priest, opened at Christmas, and the contents then given to the poor.

Activities on Boxing Day

- A time when the British show their eccentricity by taking part in all kinds of silly activities. These include bizarre traditions: including swimming the icy cold English Channel, fun runs, and charity events.
- Until 2004, Boxing Day hunts were a traditional part of the day, but the ban on fox hunting has put an end to this in its usual sense – thankfully in my opinion. Hunters will still gather dressed resplendently in red hunting coats to the sound



There are many opportunities for all our members to participate and below are the established committees along with a brief description of their responsibilities. - Production responsible for research and selection of the acts, booking all contracts and all communications with the acts during the season. This committee also retains the sound and lighting company for the concert series.
- Fund Raising responsible for raising funds to cover all expenses associated with the concerts, including payments to the acts, and payments to our sound and lighting company. The goal for the Fund-Raising Committee this year will be \$25,000 and I am confident that we

can be successful if the entire club will help by supplying leads for sponsorship to the Fund-Raising Committee. We also intend to pursue some grants this year, so please share any thoughts you may have.

- Promotion responsible for all promotion for the concerts, including all media promotions (Concert Facebook page and internet promotion) as well as promotion material (concert flyers, concert programs).
- Permits and Facilities responsible for all permits, certificates and communications with the LA County Fire, Parks and Recreation and Public Health Departments

 Concessions - this committee has been active in the concerts for many years and is responsible for all activities involved in the selling of beer and wine at the concerts, including procuring all supplies, obtaining the ABC beer and wine permits, providing security for the concerts and the logistics of setting up and taking down the concession equipment for each concert.

So here I am with some space to fill. And spea what did I do? I went to one of my favorite C

books: *The Unexpected Evolution* of Language by Justin Cord Hayes.

The word I have chosen today is: *juggernaut.* Original Definition: *wagon for Hindu god* • New Definition: *unstoppable force or object*

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One of the principal Hindu gods is *Vishnu*. Sometimes he is worshipped diredtly, and at other times, he is worshipped through one of his ten avatars (physical incarnations), the most wellknown (to westerners) being Krishna.

Since at least the twelfth century, the community of Puri has celebrated Vishnu with an unusual annual ceremony. An image of the god is placed in a large, ceremonial wagon and pulled to another location across deep sand. The image of the God is celled. *laggangeting*, which English speakers later transformed into *juggernaut*. Obviously it's not easy to pull a heavy

showed their devotion through just such an herdulean task. WhenWhen Westerners first encountered this tradidion, they saw that Vishnu's followers often moved large objects out of the way rather than try to re-route the juggernaut. Sometimes Westerners even observed people being crushed under the juggrnaut's heavy wheels.

> Stories filtered back home. These stories suggested that legions of Vishnu's followers sacrificed themselves (or were sacrificed) to Vishnu under the wheels of the juggernaut. Other tales were told of entire houses being dismantled to make way for the juggernaut.

> Thus, a juggernaut became any large, implacable, unstoppable object. The ceremony that gave English the word **juggernaut** continues to this day.

A Letter from Michael

I beard this letter read on Christmas night some time ago and decided to share it with all of you again this year. I don't know about you, but I want the letter to be true because I want to believe in miracles and angels. There's a story about a young Marine named Michael who wrote a letter home to his mother while he was in the hospital after having been wounded in Korea in 1950. A Navy Chaplain named Father Walter Muldy apparently was given the letter, checked the facts and concluded what was in the letter was true. A year later he read the letter in the public for the first time, to a gathering of some 5,000 Marines at the Naval Base in San Diego. Here is the letter:

Dear Mom,

I wouldn't dare write this letter to anyone but you because no one else would believe it. Maybe even you will find it hard but I have got to tell somebody. First off, I am in a hospital. Now don't worry, ya hear me, don't worry. I was wounded but I'm okay you understand. Okay. The doctor says that I will be up and around in a month.

But that's not what I want to tell you.

Remember when I joined the Marines last year; remember when I left, how you told me to say a prayer to St. Michael every day. You really didn't have to tell me that. Ever since I can remember you always told me to pray to St. Michael the Archangel. You even named me after him. Well I always have.

When I got to Korea, I prayed even harder. Remember the prayer that you taught me? "Michael, Michael of the morning, fresh chord of Heaven adorning," you know the rest of it. Well I said it everyday. Sometimes when I was marching or sometimes resting. But always before I went to sleep. I even got some of the other fellas to say it.

Well, one day I was with an advance detail way up over the front lines. We were scouting for the Commies. I was plodding along in the bitter cold, my breath was like cigar smoke.

I thought I knew every guy in the patrol, when along side of me comes another Marine I never met before. He was bigger than any other Marine I'd ever seen. He must have been 6'4" and built in proportion. It gave me a feeling of security to have such a body near.

Anyway, there we were trudging along. The rest of the patrol spread out. Just to start conversation I said, "Cold ain't it." And then I laughed. Here I was with a good chance of getting killed any minute and I am talking about the weather.

My companion seemed to understand. I heard him laugh softly. I looked at him, "I have never seen you before, I thought I knew every man in the outfit."

"I just joined at the last minute", he replied. "The name is Michael."

"Is that so," I said surprised. "That is my name too."

"I know," he said and then went on, "Michael, Michael of the morning ..."

I was too amazed to say anything for a minute. How did he know my name, and a prayer that you had taught me? Then I smiled to myself, every guy in the outfit knew about me. Hadn't I taught the prayer to anybody who would listen. Why now and then, they even referred to me as St. Michael. Neither of us spoke for a time and then he broke the silence.

"We are going to have some trouble up ahead."

He must have been in fine physical shape or he was breathing so lightly I couldn't see his breath. Mine poured out in great clouds. There was no smile on his face now. Trouble ahead, I thought to myself, well with the Commies all around us, that is no great revelation. Snow began to fall in great thick globs. In a brief moment the whole countryside was blotted out. And I was marching in a white fog of sticky particles. My companion disappeared.

"Michael," I shouted in sudden alarm.

I felt his hand on my arm, his voice was rich and strong, "This will stop shortly."

His prophecy proved to be correct. In a few minutes the snow stopped as abruptly as it had begun. The sun was a hard shining disc. I looked back for the rest of the patrol, there was no one in sight. We lost them in that heavy fall of snow. I looked ahead as we came over a little rise.

Mom, my heart stopped. There were seven of them. Seven Commies in their padded pants and jackets and their funny hats. Only there wasn't anything funny about them now. Seven rifles were aimed at us.

"Down Michael," I screamed and hit the frozen earth.

I heard those rifles fire almost as one. I heard the bullets. There was Michael still standing. Mom, those guys couldn't have missed, not at that range. I expected to see him literally blown to bits. But there he stood, making no effort to fire himself. He was paralyzed with fear. It happens sometimes, Mom, even to the bravest. He was like a bird fascinated by a snake. At least, that was what I thought then. I jumped up to pull him down and that was when I got mine I felt a sudden flame in my chest. I often wondered what it felt like to be hit, now I know.

I remember feeling strong arms around me, arms that laid me ever so gently on a pillow of snow. I opened my eyes, for one last look. I was dying. Maybe I was even dead, I remember thinking well, this is not so bad. Maybe I was looking into the sun. Maybe I was in shock. But it seemed I saw Michael standing erect again only this time his face was shining with a terrible splendor. As I say, maybe it was the sun in my eyes, but he seemed to change as I watched him. He grew bigger, his arms stretched out wide, maybe it was the snow falling again, but there was a brightness around him like the wings of an angel. In his hands was a sword. A sword that flashed with a million lights. Well, that is the last thing I remember until the rest of the fellas came up and found me. I do not know how much time had passed. Now and then I had but a moment's rest from the pain and fever. I remember telling them of the enemy just ahead.

"Where is Michael," I asked.

I saw them look at one another. "Where's who?" asked one.

"Michael, Michael the big Marine I was walking with just before the snow squall hit us."

"Kid," said the sergeant, "You weren't walking with anyone. I had my eyes on you the whole time. You were getting too far out. I was just going to call you in when you disappeared in the snow."

He looked at me, curiously. "How did you do it kid?"

"How'd I do what?" I asked half angry despite my wound. "This marine named Michael and I were just ..."

"Son," said the sergeant kindly, "I picked out this outfit myself and there just ain't another Michael in it. You are the only Mike in it." He paused for a minute, "Just how did you do it kid? We heard shots. There hasn't been a shot fired from your rifle. And there isn't a bit of lead in them seven bodies over the hill there."

I didn't say anything, what could I say. I could only look open-mouthed with amazement.

It was then the sergeant spoke again, "Kid," he said gently, "every one of those seven Commies was killed by a sword stroke."

That is all I can tell you Mom. As I say, it may have been the sun in my eyes, it may have been the cold or the pain. But that is what happened.

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Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Reserve Deputy Program

Back in the 1800s, the Sheriff would look to the community to form a posse and deputize citizens to assist him in the apprehension of horse thieves, murderers, or other criminals. Thankfully, we have thousands of full-time deputies to perform those duties today, but, in 2018, just like the 1800s, the Sheriff is looking to the community to find citizens to volunteer and help by becoming reserve deputy sheriffs.

Reserve deputies undergo the same training and background checks that full-time deputies receive. It's a year-long process, but, after graduation, reserve deputies can perform a wide array of duties and service to the community.

The Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Reserve Program is one of the largest in the country, with over 600 all-volunteer sworn reserve deputy sheriffs. Last year they worked 182,000 hours keeping the citizens of Los Angeles County safe. Those 182,000 hours represent millions of dollars in savings to taxpayers.

Patrolling our communities is only one of many functions performed by reserve deputies. Lifesaving search and rescue missions are performed every week by reserves as part of the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department's Search and Rescue Program. Last year reserve deputy sheriffs performed 684 missions throughout the county, saving countless lives.

Another opportunity for reserve deputy sheriffs to serve is by becoming a member of the Sheriff's Department's Posse. Posse members work patrolling trails and various community events on horseback.

Reserve deputies also help solve crimes by working in many of the Sheriff's Department's detective units, such as Homicide Bureau, Narcotics Bureau, Fraud and Cyber Crime Bureau, and Special Victims Bureau. We also have reserves who ride street and off-road motorcycles for the Department.

Reserve deputies come from all walks of life and from a wide variety of professions. The common thread of all is a burning desire to give back to their community and assist their fellow citizens.

If you are interested in signing up - just like citizens did over a 150 years ago - there is a reserve deputy academy scheduled to start in February 2019. Please contact the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Reserve Forces Detail at 323-526-5100 and ask for Assistant Director Mike Leum to get started.
