Ed Jasnow has been asked that question all his life, and he's finally decided to answer it once and for all.

Jasnow has been a member of this club for over 29 years, serving as President in the 1995-96 term. He was voted Rotarian of the Year in 2006. He is currently serving his fifth term on the Board of Directors of the club, and is also serving his third term on the Board of the Altadena Rotary Charities (ARC) Foundation.

His main activity is as Chairman of the Teacher Mini-Grant Program, which provides \$400 grants to teachers who submit proposals to enhance the classroom experience of their students. He has been doing this for over 20 years, and estimates that our club has given over \$400,000 to teachers over that period.

Civilization and Movement Rotary's Wheel and More

Te are entering the season of holiday and commemorative events, having just celebrated Memorial Day and with July 4th not too far away. Altadena Rotary Club members traditionally raise flags on Lake Ave and elsewhere as we celebrate with the community and recognise our national pride.

Newer members of the Club might not yet have seen Rotary's flag which is carried at District and International events. An official flag was formally adopted by Rotary International at the 1929 Convention in Dallas, Texas. The Rotary flag consists of a

white field with the official wheel emblem emblazoned in gold in the center of the field The four depressed spaces on the rim of the Rotary wheel are colored royal blue. The words **Rotary** and **International** printed at the top and bottom depressions on the wheel rim are also gold. The shaft in the hub and the key way of the wheel are white.

The first official Rotary flag reportedly was flown in Kansas City Missouri, in January 1915. In 1922 a small Rotary flag was carried over the South Pole by Admiral Richard Byrd, a member of the Winchester, Virginia Rotary Club. Four years later, the admiral carried a Rotary flag in his expedition to the North Pole. Some Rotary clubs use the official Rotary flag as a banner





ings. In these

instances it is appropriate to print the words Rotary Club above the wheel symbol, and the name of the city, state or nation below the emblem. The Rotary flag is always prominently displayed at the World Headquarters as well as at all conventions and official

events of Rotary International.

So what about the wheel emblem? A wheel has been the symbol of Rotary since early days. The first design was made by Chicago Rotarian Montague Bear, an engraver who drew a simple wagon wheel, with a few lines to

show dust and motion. The wheel was said to illustrate Civilization and Movement. Most of the early clubs had some form of wagon wheel on their publications and letterheads. Finally, in 1922, it was decided that all Rotary clubs should adopt a single design as the exclusive emblem of Rotarians. Thus, in 1923, the present gear wheel, with 24 cogs and six spokes was adopted by the

Budzyn described to us how veterans — when they return home after finishing their service — have an enormous adjustment to make. In many if not most cases, they joined the military right out of high school, stepping out of the home in which their parents made decisions for them into the military in which their superiors controlled all aspects of their lives. They return, never having lived as independent adults, with no college degree and with no clue how to successfully transition back into society.

Although many of the returning vets suffer from various degrees of physical and mental disability, about 75 percent have no disabilities except the lack of knowledge as to how to navigate the transition. Without help, these men and women have an incredible potential for anxiety and depression. They have a strong propensity to become isolated, lonely and confused, with a loss of identity. Often these veterans turn to alcohol and drugs, become homeless and some end up committing suicide.

Leadership Pasadena provides a compassionate, personal, inexpensive program, not only to these lost returning vets, but also to civilians who need support to get

ne of the things we do for our community is put flags down Lake

The Smith team traveled together in the truck from one light pole with flag brackets to the next, while the Hill team split up, with Cox and McCurry walking with the ladder extended and Hill driving, with the flags in

his van. The flags that went up this weekend will play in the wind until after July 04.

Our newer members don't remember when we put the flags out fairly early in the morning on the day they were commemorating and then took them down before sunset on the same day.

Thanks to Craig Cox and probably a few others behind the scenes and their determination, we now put the flags on light poles so they are illuminated through the night and can proudly decorate Lake Avenue for several days in a row.

works. Special events are organized for the students, including health day, CalTech day, and arts day at the Huntington Library. The students are taught networking skills, team building skills, how to develop personal branding and their own elevator pitch. The Veterans program runs from May through October, and the civilian program runs from September through April.

Budzyn then introduced one of the graduates of the Leadership Pasadena program, Martin Kevin Hernandez Barajas, a very impressive former US Marine. He talked about his difficult adjustment upon his return from duty and how the Leadership Pasadena program helped him develop self-confidence and learn the skills to navigate his new world. He has since worked as the campaign manager for a school board candidate, be-

come the veterans' advisor for the Mayor of Azusa and was named an honor ary member of Azusa Rotary.



Barajas has recently graduated with a Bachelor's degree in criminal justice and is currently studying for the upcoming LSAT, the test to get into law school

Former Pasadena Mayor, Bill Bogaard, said this about the program: "Pasadena is

unique for the quantity, quality and compassion of its non-profit organizations serving the many needs of this community. But these good things don't just happen, they result from leadership ... thoughtful and well-informed persons who are committed to the building and the betterment of our community. Rotary International Association. A group of engineers advised that the geared wheel was mechanically unsound and would not work without a *keyway* in the center of the gear to attach it to a power shaft. So, in 1923 the keyway was added, and the design which we now know was formally adopted as the official Rotary International emblem.

One of the colorful traditions of many Rotary clubs is the exchange of small banners, flags or pennants. Rotarians traveling to distant locations often take banners to exchange at *make up* meetings as a token of friendship. Many clubs use the decorative banners they have received for attractive displays at club meetings and district events. The Rotary International board recognized the growing popularity

of the banner exchange back in 1959 and suggested that those clubs which participate in such exchanges give careful thought to the design of their banners in order that they be distinctive and expressive of the community and country of which the club is a part. It is recommended that banners include pictures, slogans or designs which portray the territorial area of the club.

Exchanging club banners is a very pleasant custom, especially when a creative and artistic banner tells an interesting story of community pride. The exchange of banners is a significant tradition of Rotary and serves as tangible symbol of our international fellowship.




