This Week Glenn Biasi, PhD Earthquakes & Earthquake Early Warning in California Program Host Tom McCurry

Dr. Glenn Biasi is a native of Southern California. He received a bachelor's degree from UC San Diego, served with the US Air Force in San Bernardino, and got his master's degree in geological sciences at UC Riverside.

Biasi transferred to the University of Oregon to study the deep earth structure under California and Nevada. After completing his PhD, he worked 22 years at the University of Nevada, Reno, working at the Nevada Seismological Network.

He has studied earthquakes, worked on fault structure on a range of scales, and developed new methods for seismic hazard estimation. He is a core member of the Working Group on California Earthquake Probabilities and contributed paleoseismic and fault studies to the most recent USGS seismic hazard estimates for *Please turn to This Week p. 3*

Bob Harrison, one of the co-owners of this Pasadena institution, gave us great insight into what it's like to run a major restaurant.

The restaurant used to be on Green Street, but moved to it's current location in 1983. It's been re-modeled several times, and there have been several changes to the menu. For example, quinoa was not on the early menus.

The mission of the restaurant is to guarantee a return visit. Their motto is, *Great hospitality means treating people like they were at home, even if you wish they were.*

Their most popular item on the menu is the Diane Salad. It accounts for one-third of their sales. The salad was named after a friend who created the recipe. They told her that if she gave them the recipe, they would name it after her.

Another famous item offered exclusively at Green Street is their fabulous zucchini bread. It is baked daily and shipped all over the world. Harrison told an amusing story about a woman who claimed that she developed the recipe for the zucchini bread. They let her continue to say that, even though it wasn't true. One day, she called to say that her house had burned down and she lost everything, including the zucchini bread recipe. She asked Harrison if he could send it to her. He said they don't give out their rec-

Harrison said that they have to deal with some difficult customers. People come to the restaurant hungry, and that can make them impatient.

The restaurant has 85 employees, many having worked there 10, 20, and 30 years. The goal of the restaurant is to hire nice people and treat them well. Harrison pointed out the difficulties associated with accelerating the increase in the minimum wage from \$10 to \$15. They are faced with the issues of raising prices and cutting work

The restaurant business is very challenging. There is a high turnover rate. Harrison talked about how the restaurant scene on South Lake Avenue has changed over the last 20 years. Instead of independent restaurants, there are quick food chains. He told the joke that if you want to be a millionaire, take six million dollars and open a restaurant. In one year, you'll be a millionaire.

Harrison brought up the subject of tipping. With tips, servers actually make \$40.00 per hour. Under what is known as

tipping credit, 43 states allow restaurants to pay servers less than the minimum wage. California is not one of those states. Additionally, there are payroll taxes and workman's comp insurance to pay. They also have to provide training regarding sexual harassment. Restaurants work on very thin profit margins.

Green Street also has a very large catering business for people who love their food.

Harrison encouraged us to eat at independently owned restaurants. It's for sure many of us will go to Green Street.
