





Don Kenney International Brotherhood of Magicians Program Host: Craig Cox

Don Kenny was born and raised in the city of Los Angeles. He has lived here his whole life. When he was thirteen, his father bought him his first magic set. From then on, he spent Saturday afternoons at the movies and the rest of his free time reading and practicing magic tricks. He was also able to see many magicians perform on stage including Dante, Harry Blackstone Sr., John Calvert, Mandrake the Magician and many others.

"Back in the 40s", Kenny recalls, "the motion picture studios had their own theaters where they would show their own movies and present vaudeville acts before or after the films. I would take a street car into Downtown LA and,, if I had to go further, I would take a bus to get to the theaters and see the shows." Program Review

Strummin' on the Ol' Banjo

or an instrument that seems such a quintessential part of American folk music, it came as a surprise to learn that the banjo's history can be traced to Africa.

Not only is Pitt Kinsolving an accomplished folk musician, he is also a noted scholar of folk music history. As Kinsolving explained, the precursor to the banjo using an animal skin stretched over a hollow gourd to reverberate the sound. The neck was a simple stick without the fret boards that have since been incorporated.

Slaves in this country fashioned banjos reminiscent of their traditional instruments. In the 1820s, Joel Walker Sweeney learned to play the banjo, and traveled as a minstrel and performer, teaching others to adopt this simple but expressive instrument. Around this time, a fifth string was added and wooden frames replaced the traditional gourd. In the 1890s, banjos became part of the ragtime music, and a fingerpicking style replaced the downpicking style. Country music performers took up the banjo, and it became associated with the bluegrass sound. The banjo continues its popularity thanks to noted performers like Steve Martin and Craig Cox.

Kinsolving became fascinated with the banjo as a child, and has played the instrument for more than 50 years. He enjoys playing a variety of instruments in a range of styles and genres, from American bluegrass to Irish folk. He demonstrated his picking prowess with a rendition of Stephen Foster's timeless Oh,

Last Week in the News

The Mortgage Bankers Association said its seasonally adjusted composite index of mortgage applications for the week ending August 5 rose 21.7 percent. Refinancing applications increased 30.4 percent. Purchase volume fell 0.9 percent.

Wholesalers increased their inventories 0.6 percent to \$458.7 billion in June. This followed a revised 1.7 percent rise in May. Sales at the wholesale level rose 0.6 percent in June to \$395.8 billion. On a year-over-year basis, sales were 15.4 percent higher since June 2010.

The trade deficit increased to \$53.1 billion in June from a revised \$50.8 billion in May. Exports fell 2.3 percent to \$170.9 billion. Imports decreased 0.8 percent to \$223.9 billion.

Retail sales rose 0.5 percent to \$390.42 billion in July after an upwardly revised 0.3 percent increase in June. The gain posted in July was the largest in four months. On a year-over-year basis, retail sales rose 8.5 percent.

Total business inventories rose 0.3 percent in June to \$1.518 trillion, up 11.1 percent from a year ago. Total business sales increased 0.4 percent to \$1.187 trillion in June, up 12.4 percent from a year ago. The total business inventories/sales ratio in June was 1.28.

The Reuters/University of Michigan consumer sentiment index for August's preliminary reading fell to 54.9 from 63.7 in July. The reading was the lowest in more than 30 years, surpassing a record low of 55.3 set in November 2008.

Initial claims for unemployment benefits fell by 7,000 to 395,000 for the week ending August 6. Continuing claims for the week ending July 30 fell by 60,000 to 3.7 million.

Upcoming on the economic calendar

are reports on the housing market index on August 15, housing starts on August 16 and existing home sales on August 18.

Mind Your Money Federal Grants and Loans for College

Pell Grants are the foundation of federal student financial aid, to which aid from other federal and nonfederal sources might be added. A Pell Grant, unlike a loan, does not have to be repaid. Award amounts change yearly. The current maximum award per student per year is \$5,550. The amount made available depends on financial need, costs to attend school, status as a full-time or part-time student, and plans to attend school for a full academic year or less.

Pell Grants are usually awarded to undergraduate students, but some exceptions are available to students enrolled in a post-baccalaureate teacher certificate program. The amount of other student aid you might qualify for does not affect the amount of your Pell Grant. For more information on Pell Grants, visit www.ed.gov/programs/fpg/index.html.

If you must borrow money for college, think federal aid first. A federal student loan allows students and their parents to borrow money to pay school expenses, such as tuition and fees, room and board, books, supplies and transportation.

Federal student loans have lower interest rates and offer better repayment terms than loans from banks or other private sources. Federal student loans offer low fixed interest rates, income-based repayment plans, loan forgiveness and postponement options, including deferment of loan payments when a student returns to school. For these reasons, students and parents should always exhaust federal student loan options before con-

sidering a private loan.

Student Ioan limits range from \$5,500 to \$12,500 per year for undergraduates and up to \$20,500 each year for graduate students. To apply for a federal student Ioan, complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at www.fafsa.gov. For additional information on federal student aid programs, visit www.federalstudentaid.ed.gov/pubs.

decision to pursue a career in medicine." Witnessing the prevalence of tuberculosis in Southeast Asia and the Middle East kindled his desire to become a physician. Wright is currently enrolled as a full-time student at PCC, but somehow finds time to volunteer at Huntington Memorial Hospital, tutor students in biology, and work in a laboratory twice a week.
