Program Review

The LA County Regional Occupation Program Can this augment our Current Program?

The Los Angeles County Regional Oc cupation Program (LACOROP) was established in 1974 by the Los Angeles County Office of Education. It partners with the county, 23 school districts, apprenticeship programs, High School for the Arts, the Los Angeles County International Polytechnic High School, and Juvenile Court Schools. In addition, LACOROP works with community colleges, business,

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industry, labor organizations, and employment agencies in planning workforce preparation training programs. It is one of 74 ROPs in the state.

ROP Consultant, Sarah Vielma, explained that LACOROP is one of 12 ROPs in Los Angeles County. All ROPs operate under state guidelines and serve over 418,000 students in California.

Programs used to take place after school hours. Today, more and more programs are taking place during instructional hours.

Students benefit in many ways:

- They are encouraged to apply and reinforce their academic skills with real world experiences.
- They can obtain job-placement and career counseling assistance.

Economic Update In the News

The Mortgage Bankers Association said its seasonally adjusted composite index of mortgage applications for the week ending September 7 rose 11.1 percent. Refinancing applications increased 12 percent. Purchase volume rose 8 percent.

The trade deficit increased to \$42 billion in July from a revised \$41.9 billion in June. Exports fell \$1.9 billion or 1 percent to \$183.3 billion. Imports fell \$1.8 billion or 0.8 percent to \$225.3 billion.

Wholesalers increased their inventories 0.7 percent to \$485.2 billion in July. Sales at the wholesale level fell 0.1 percent to \$402.4 billion in July. On a yearover-year basis, sales were 2.7 percent higher since July 2011. The producer price index, which tracks wholesale price inflation, rose 1.7 percent in August, following a 0.3 percent increase in July. Compared to August 2011, wholesale prices have risen 2 percent. Core prices — excluding food and fuel — rose 0.2 percent in August.

Retail sales rose 0.9 percent to \$406.7 billion in August. This follows a revised 0.6 percent increase in July. Compared to August 2011, retail sales have increased 4.7 percent.

Consumer prices rose 0.6 percent in August, following a flat reading in July. Compared to August 2011, consumer prices have risen 1.7 percent. Consumer prices at the core rate — excluding volatile food and energy prices — were up 0.1 percent in August. Industrial production at the nation's factories, mines and utilities fell 1.2 percent in August after a 0.5 percent rise in July. Compared to August 2011, industrial production has increased 2.8 percent. Capacity utilization eased to 78.2 percent in August from 79.2 percent in July.

Initial claims for unemployment benefits for the week ending September 8 rose by 15,000 to 382,000. Continuing claims for the week ending September 1 fell by 49,000 to 3.282 million.

Upcoming on the economic calendar are reports on the housing market index on September 18, and existing home sales and housing starts on September 19.

Because of a prior commitment, I had to miss our weekly meeting of September 13 when DG Whitlock made her visit to Altadena. But I had a plan for a makeup. The week before I'd told *sgvnewgen** club president Will Kelso that I'd join his group at Fronteras Mexican Grill that evening.

My intentions were good, but I clearly marked myself as a member of the *older generation* when my plan came to naught. First, I started out way too late to make a 6p meeting. What I hadn't understood was that the traffic from Altadena to Alhambra any time after 5p is truly exasperating! It was 6:15 before I finally arrived. And then — no parking. Anywhere!!

Once I realized that this makeup was not going to happen, I turned back to Altadena to contemplate how — as an *old guy*—I just didn't get the concept of making a *NewGen* meeting. I should have left at 4:30, both to avoid the heavy traffic and to get an early parking space. The time before 6p should have been spent leisurely at the bar, which (in concert with a later meal) would have given my old body a bit more time to process a drink or two before again hitting the road. Hindsight is always perfect, they say

PDG Sunil K. Zachariah provided a keynote address with my this week's title to a District 3190 assemblage at Bangalore on September 9, and the transcript of his remarks was posted to the *Rotary* and *Tech* sections of Rotarians on the Internet (ROTI) a few days later. Here are edited excerpts which I thought might be of interest as we at Altadena Rotary attempt to reach out to the New Generation.

up in a world where the use of online social networking is part of their life. Although 30 percent of Facebook users are above 35 years, it is the 70 percent below 35 that are more at home with Facebook. 48 percent of those 18 to 34 log into Facebook right when they wake up. About 28 percent of them check FB on their smart-phones before even getting up from their bed. Even in this group below 35 you can divide the Facebook users into two groups — those below 24 and those above. Last year the below 24-year-olds grew 74 percent on Facebook; it is this subgroup that I venture to call the Facebook generation."

We've heard a part of this message before. Dr. Mike Ukleja presented a December 2011 program on *Managing the Millenials*. Quoting Boyd Hudson's program review, "It could be said that the first language of the millennials is technology. Millennials work very well in teams, as they have been involved in teams their entire education and working lives According to Ukleja, the millennials are the first generation that has not needed an authority figure to access information."

And what did Ukleja recommend? Among others, these were two of his admonitions for managers: "Build Relationships. Reach out and connect." "Put their imaginations to work. Let them work outside the box to arrive at their own approaches and solutions"

PDG Zachariah's understanding is that this *Facebook Generation* is both more global in its outlook and more serviceoriented than most earlier generations. The former characteristic may call into question our Rotarian tendency to divide service into *youth* and *non-youth* (*i.e.*, *community*) segments.

But it is the latter characteristic that offers the prospect of a powerful partnership with the young. This *Facebook Generation*, owing to an awareness born of constant communication, is upset with everything that is not fair and just. And that makes it open to our message. Because, as Zachariah states, "Rotary is indeed the world's largest army of good people."

It is a point we will do well to remember in those moments when we despair that we [may not] have much in common with our younger Rotarians and their peers. We can offer a vehicle that is quite useful for those who truly wish to *change the world*. All WE (the *old guys*) have to do is get beyond our generational differences and focus on a mutual attraction to service.


