This Week Larry Skaggs District Governor District 5300, 2014 - 2015 Guest Program Host: Hal Yorke

Larry Skaggs was born in northern IL and grew up in the western Chicago suburbs. He began his lifetime of service by joining the Boy Scouts, where he attained the rank of Eagle Scout. In 1975, Larry was hired by the Aurora IL Police Dept. and during the course of his employment worked in nearly every division of the department. After a successful and enjoyable career, he retired as a Lieutenant in 2003.

Skaggs first joined Rotary as a member of the Rotary Club of Aurora Sunrise, serving for several years on the board of directors and he was named club president in 2001 - 2002.

Upon retirement from the police department, he moved to Henderson, $N\nabla$ and worked for several years as a college instructor, mainly teaching Criminal Justice courses.

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On Statistics . . .

There are three kinds of lies: lies, damned lies, and statistics." (quote of unknown origin popularized by Mark Twain). This phrase is often used to cast doubt on the statistical arguments used by an opponent. Indeed, statistics are frequently misused, misinterpreted, or faked to prove a weak point or a damned lie.

Some of the most egregious purposeful misuses of statistics are: carefully picking the data to be included in a study while discarding unfavorable data, posing loaded questions designed to get a certain result, overinterpretation of small number statistics (i.e. using anecdotal information rather than conducting a proper unbiased statistical study), generalizing the results of a statistical study of a hand-picked sample to a group outside the sample, and using correlations to incorrectly imply causality. Correlations do not necessarily imply causality. It is possible to statistically demonstrate causality, as for cigarettes and lung cancer, or more recently, for second-hand smoke and lung cancer, but such studies

have to be performed with extreme care to be statistically relevant.

So how can we decide what to believe and what to discard? If there are large sums of money involved, we should be generally skeptical of the statistical arguments presented by those who have the most to gain or lose. The discussion revolving around cigarette smoke and lung cancer is a case in point.

As a final example, let us consider the uncanny ability of Paul the Psychic Octopus to correctly predict the outcome of soccer matches. We only heard about Paul in 2010 after he had amassed an im-

responsibilities and their influence on preparing young people for their role in the world. His thesis is that, by focusing on rights, people end up divided, but, by focusing on responsibility, people are united.

The human mind carries enormous potential. A wasted mind translates into wasted hopes. His question to the club was: Are we creating a culture that helps people be life-long learners so they can go out and be life-long teachers? A culture where people see things that need to be fixed and they take it upon themselves to make things better rather than waiting on government, academia, or the churches.

Cunningham shared statistics regarding US teens' declining world rankings in math, science and reading. Many youth today do not read (more than 140 characters). Reading classic literature hones critical thinking skills while enlarging our understanding of human experience. Because of technology, classics are more available than ever. But they are of absolutely no benefit if no one is reading them.

In his book The Global Achievement Gap" Tony Wagner describes 7 critical skills that must be taught to the next generation. They are:

1) Critical thinking and problem solving,

2) Collaboration,

3) Agility and adaptability,

The obligation to teach these skills rests on all of us - not just the schools.

Cunningham ended by telling a story about a pastor who was in Africa and admired the impala's ability to leap 30 feet in a single bound. When he came home, he noticed an impala in the zoo being contained by an 8-foot fence. Knowing the ability of the animal, he asked the zoo keeper how the small fence was able to be effective. The zoo keeper answered – "we get them when they are young." Whether our youth excel or fail depends on how we teach them while they are young.

Economic Update In The News

The Mortgage Bankers Association said its seasonally adjusted composite index of mortgage applications for the week ending July 4 rose 1.9 percent from the previous week. Purchase volume rose 4 percent. Refinancing applications increased 0.4 percent.

Retail sales rose 1.7 percent for the week ending July 5, according to the ICSC-Goldman Sachs index. On a yearover-year basis, retailers saw sales increase 3.3 percent

According to the Federal Reserve, monthly consumer credit debt rose \$19.6 billion in May for a total credit debt level of \$3,194.6 billion. Revolving debt, which includes credit cards, increased \$1.8 billion to \$872.2 billion. Non-revolving debt, which includes car loans, rose \$17.8 billion to \$2,322.4 billion.

Motor vehicle sales rose 1.2 percent in June to an annualized sales rate of 16.98 million cars and light trucks. It was the strongest selling rate since July 2006.

Wholesalers increased their inventories 0.5 percent to \$532.7 billion in May. Sales at the wholesale level rose 0.7 percent to \$453.2 billion in May. On a year-over-year basis, sales were 6.6 percent higher than in May 2013. The seasonally adjusted wholesale inventories/sales ratio in May 2014 was 1.18.

Initial claims for unemployment benefits for the week ending July 5 fell by 11,000 to 304,000. Continuing claims for the week ending June 28 rose by 10,000 to 2.584 million. The less volatile four-week average of claims for unemployment benefits was also 311,500.

Upcoming on the economic calendar are reports on retail sales on July 15, the housing market index on July 16 and housing starts on July 17.

Knowledge Builder What You Should Know about Easements Easements . . . Who owns the property?

In its simplest terms, an easement is the legal right to use or cross over somebody else's property for a specific reason. For example, a property easement might allow city workers the right to build or perform maintenance on a city sewage pipe that runs under your front lawn. Furthermore, the property homeowner cannot interfere with access to the pipe by building a structure or putting a fence over the easement.

Before buying a home, you need to know if easements affect potential property or surrounding areas, and the restrictions, if any, homeowners must adhere to. The following information will help you be better informed about easements:

Easements are typically categorized as being either affirmative or negative. An

affirmative easement entitles the holder to do something on another individual's land, while a negative easement deprives owners of the right to do something on their property.

Utility easements are perhaps the most popular easements that homebuyers encounter. These allow utility companies to lay storm drains or sewage pipes, as well as telephone or electrical lines.

Find out if your property borders any easements. Easements don't have to be on your property to cause problems, such as the future building of unsightly utility towers.

You can use a plat map (a diagram detailing boundary or property lines for a particular plot of land) to locate easements on a property tract. Detailed plat maps can be obtained from the property title company or at the county planning office. However, regardless of the property type or location, the most thorough way to detect easements is to hire a surveyor to advise homebuyers.

Finally, easements can sometimes be terminated, but that usually requires the help of a real estate attorney.
