Geneonology comes through Big Time

nn Hunt was a regular American housewife with little interest in her past when her daughter decided to study the family ancestry. What she discovered was the veritable *Mother Lode* of Genealogy.

Hunt had been born in England in 1936, the fraternal twin of one Liz Hamel. They had been separated for 78 years completely unaware of each other's existence. They were separated at birth when their unmarried mother could not care for both. Hunt — the prettier sister — was given up for adoption because Hamel — the less adoptable baby — had been marked by scoliosis. Hunt and Hamel finally met with their families at the Marriott hotel in Fullerton, California on May 1, 2014. They have agreed to be part of a *Study of Twins* at the Twins Study Center that professor Nancy J, Segal directs at Cal State University Fullerton.

78 years is the known world record for reuniting twins after separation. The research possibilities are intriguing to scientists since these two ladies have at least half identical genes but almost completely different environmental backgrounds.



Economic Update In The News — May 19, 2014

The combined construction of new single-family homes and apartments in April rose 13.2 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1,072,000 units, compared to the revised March estimate of 947,000 units. Single-family starts increased 0.8 percent. Volatile multifamily starts rose 39.6 percent. Overall, housing unit starts were up 26.4 percent in April when compared to the previous year. Applications for new building permits, seen as an indicator of future activity, were at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1,080,000 units, 8 percent above the revised March rate of 1,000,000 units.

The Mortgage Bankers Association said its seasonally adjusted composite index of mortgage applications for the week ending May 9 rose 3.6 percent from the previous week. Purchase volume fell 1 percent. Refinancing applications increased 7 percent.

The monthly National Association of Home Builders/Wells Fargo housing market index fell one point in May to 45 from a revised April reading of 46. An index reading below 50 indicates negative sentiment about the housing market.

Retail sales rose 0.1 percent to \$434.6 billion in April. This follows a revised 1.5 percent increase in March. Compared to a year ago, April retail sales have increased 4 percent.

Consumer prices rose 0.3 percent in April, following a 0.2 percent increase in March. Compared to a year ago, April consumer prices have risen 2 percent.

Consumer prices at the core rate — excluding volatile food and energy prices — were up 0.2 percent in April.

Total business sales increased 1 percent to \$1,325.7 billion in March, up 4.3 percent from a year ago. Total business inventories rose 0.4 percent to \$1,717.2 billion in March, up 4.7 percent from a year ago. The total business inventories/sales ratio in March was 1.3.

Initial claims for unemployment benefits for the week ending May 10 fell by 24,000 to 297,000, the lowest level since May 2007. Continuing claims for the week ending May 3 fell by 9,000 to 2.667 million. The less volatile four-week average of claims for unemployment benefits was 323,250.

Upcoming on the economic calendar are reports on existing home sales on May 22 and new home sales on May 23.

Knowledge Builder How to Use a Plat Map

Plat maps convey information that is beneficial to Real Estate Agents and their homebuyers. A plat map is a diagram detailing boundary or property lines for a particular plot of land. For real estate purposes, a plat map will show a tract of land and how it is separated into divided parcels, indicating the placement and length of property lines, easements and right-of-ways on the land.

Drawn to scale, plat maps convey information that is beneficial to Real Estate Agents and their homebuyers. With a plat map in hand, you can know:

Locations of the property's tract easements (power, water, sewer, phone,

- etc.); recreation areas; roads; greenbelts; and monuments and dimensions for measuring and identifying lot boundaries
- Length and width and square feet of the parceled property, easement areas, parks, etc.
- Longitude and latitude lines of the property
- Lot tract numbers, builder lot numbers and parcel numbers
- Shape of each lot (parcel boundary) and its orientation (north, south, east and west)
- Where iron pins/pipes were set as property markers, and
- Other useful information

The more atypical the shape of the plot of land, the better the chance it could have an erroneous reading of the property's square footage on the county record. The plat map can help determine discrepancies with the square footage, which could be helpful in understanding a home's true value.

Also, plat maps are excellent visual tools that can help orient a buyer. For example, a review of the map shows the homebuyer which side of the house gets the sun first, neighbor proximity, yard size, etc.

Basic plat maps can be found online, but usually without the important measurement and location data. Detailed plat maps can be obtained from the property title company or at the county planning office.

Last week our guests included three of the four Muir High School Juniors we sponsored to the District's Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) program. They


