**E**ncouragement from parents and significant adults can play a vital role in helping a child realize his or her infinite possibilities. Affirm children whenever possible, from their taking a first step to tackling a first job outside the home.

The following are some other ways parents can help unlock a child's potential:

### ***Openly Enjoy & Celebrate***

#### ***Your Children's Accomplishments***

Every child's life is filled with accomplishments and milestones that ought to be recognized within a family. Praise, affirm, cheer, endorse, or bless them whenever and however you can, as they rise to an occasion, meet a new challenge, or master a new skill.

#### ***Expect Great Things***

Too many people limit themselves because they have low expectations for themselves and others. Let children know they are capable of doing great things. Consistently and clearly remind children that "Life is what you make it."

#### ***Be Charitable when***

#### ***Children make Mistakes***

When children make a mistake, help

them get up from their fall and support them as they work to move forward.

### ***Teach Children to Make decisions and Solve Problems***

Choosing and deciding can be instilled in children at the earliest ages. Some simple ways of doing this include presenting a child with choices and decisions to make using these kinds of questions: Do you want to eat at 6 or 7 o'clock? Do you want pizza or spaghetti for dinner? Do you want to wear a jacket or a sweater? Begin this process early, and children will gradually develop their abilities to discern, make choices, and live with their decisions.

# Program Review

## Making Vocational Service Work



That was the focus of our speaker last week, Dennis

Franklin, who is the current District 5300 Chair of Training. He stated that Vocational Service – one of the Five Avenues of Service for Rotary – is using your profes-

sional skills and trades to help others. He described his background. He came from a family of six children, grew up in the Miami area, and found various ways to earn money. He sold mangoes and avocados, and sold golf balls that he found at a nearby golf course and washed. His first real job was as a dishwasher at age 14.

He eventually got into sales, became a seafood broker, then a stock broker, and then an account representative at Shearson-Lehman. He later became the CEO of a small credit union, where he was able to learn the entire business. He now serves as a financial advisor at Wells Fargo Bank.

He joined the Rotary Club of Monrovia for the purpose of helping the community. In addition to serving as President of that club, he has also served as Assistant District Governor for District 5300. In his current capacity as Chair of Training, he spends time training President-Elects for their upcoming terms. The District is currently planning on initiating a Rotary Leadership Institute. It will be for all new Rotary members, and will be conducted as three, one-day sessions, divided into six classes. This Institute will not only help these people become better Rotarians, but



it will help them become better employees, entrepreneurs, family members, and just become better people.

He reminded us that one of the purposes of Vocational Service is to value our skills and professions. We hope Dennis Franklin will be able to bring the Avenue of Vocational Service back out of the shadows, so we all can use our skills, trades, and professions to help our community. Ed Jasnow ☉



## International Affairs and Foreign Policy Now

over the past two decades has been the most cataclysmic for American interests abroad in the entire history of the Republic.

First, there was the Iraq War. Without question, it was the greatest foreign policy catastrophe of the past 40 years. De-Baathification destroyed the Iraqi state, gave rise to a Sunni insurgency, and cost thousands of American lives and trillions of dollars.

Meanwhile, Iran offered to dismantle its nuclear program, assist the US in stabilizing Afghanistan and Iraq, cease its support of militants and even accept the existence of Israel. The Bush administration rejected it. Iran then tested a single ten-centrifuge uranium enrichment program which increased to over 19,000 centrifuges by 2014. Under the 2015 nuclear deal, that limit is now over 5000 centrifuges, which continue to enrich uranium for the creation of fissile material.

Then there is the matter of overthrowing governments friendly to the United States (such as Egypt). These governments ended up being replaced with the Muslim Brotherhood, dictatorship and chaos. The Arab uprisings – combined with the rapid withdrawal from Iraq – led to the formation of ISIS, which subsequently took over much of Iraq and Syria and is now found in 32 countries of the world ... funded by US ally Saudi Arabia.

There is also Libya. Gaddafi had previously given up his WMD program and sought to reconstitute himself into the international arena. The price he paid for this cooperation was severe. Relying on US assurances, Russia did not vote for UN Resolution 1973; enabling military intervention to protect civilians under the explicit understanding that this would mean No regime change

The US immediately reneged on the deal. NATO bombing in Libya led to Gaddafi's overthrow in favor of ISIS-style militants. Four Americans – including Ambassador Stevens – were murdered at the diplomatic compound in Benghazi. Today Libya is a failed state. Obama has since labelled this his single greatest failure as president.

So much for the *reset* with Russia. In the wake of our reneging on the Libya deal, Russia became hostile and resurgent in Europe. After the Georgia conflict, Russia reorganized its military and began fielding new medium-range missiles in violation of the INF Treaty. In 2014, Putin annexed Crimea and fueled the Ukrainian civil war in open defiance of NATO and the United States.

Then there's Syria. In 2011, the *Ad Assad must go* (six years later he's still in power) destroyed America's credibility around the world by imposing a *redline* on chemical weapons being used in Syria that the US was never willing to enforce. In the end, the US had to be bailed out by Russia, who

brokered a deal with Assad to have those weapons removed

Most damning in Syria is the Secretary of State's boast about how she strongly advocated arming Sunni rebels against Assad. Of course, ISIS later captured Mosul, seizing billions of dollars in US military equipment.

While the US was lurching from one failure to the next in the Middle East, massive challenges arose in Asia. North Korea has completed four nuclear tests and has made strides in long-range ballistic missile technology. As a consequence, the Administration bequeaths our next President with a North Korea that will have the capability to conduct a nuclear strike on the US within an eight-year term of office.

When George W. Bush went into Iraq, the US economy was eight times larger than China's. Today, China's economy is about three-quarters that of the US and will certainly eclipse it within a decade

China is America's greatest long-term challenge, and is fast reemerging as a global superpower that seeks to expel the United States from Asia. It commits cyber theft on an industrial scale, employs mercantilist trade practices and currency manipulation, and, of course, is asserting its expansive territorial claims by force. China has dredged 3000 acres of new land in the South China Sea for strategic military access, and the Administration has done nothing to stop them. The US Navy is increasingly unable

# Form & Line by Jacque Foreman

It's time to go back to one of my favorite little books, *The Unexpected Evolution of Language* by Justin Cord Hayes.

This time I'll discuss *Garbage* and *Garble*. And, if there's room, another word.

## Garbage

The *original definition* referred to the parts of an animal not eaten, worn, or in other ways useful, e.g., making tools of something useful or beautiful out of the bone.

Hayes asks us to consider medieval times when people had no paper towels, disposable diapers, entertainment magazines, those damnable plastic grocery bags which many say have created islands in the ocean, plastic bottles, and many other things that we nonchalantly toss out today.

Since I grew up in the 40s and 50s, I remember when things we toss today were fixed and not summarily thrown out: things such as radios, telephones, garden tools with broken handles, and torn clothes and socks with holes.

Anyway, for the early part of its life as part of the English language, *Garbage* referred mostly to parts of an animal that were not useful. In short, these animal parts were useless and *disposable*.

Hayes goes on to say that, somewhere around the 1600s, the meaning of the words *Garbage* and *Garble* became intertwined. *Garbage* already was associated with piles of useless stuff that even then were beginning to clog up our planet.

But there is something laudable about the garbage heaps left by older civilizations and beside structures that have been long abandoned. Without them, we would have no idea how the citizens of those now lifeless ruins lived. One wonders what future civilizations will think about us and the way we lived. But, let's pull these two words together if we can.

## Garble

The *original definition* was to *sift*, and referred specifically to spices. You see, a spice merchant would stop at a Mediterranean port and purchase a barrel of some spice. And, in order to make sure that he wasn't being cheated, he would carefully *sift* through the contents to make sure that they weren't filled with impurities or fillers.

If the merchant were dishonest, *sifting*

### *combined with Positive Thinking*

Consistently remind children that, while opportunities abound in life, they come to those who have a high work ethic coupled with an almost unbridled optimism.

### *Encourage Patience*

Most people have a tendency toward wanting immediate gratification. But because true satisfaction and lasting rewards come through diligent and persistent pursuit of a goal, the ability to handle delays en route to a goal should be instilled in children.

Here is a simple exercise to use when your child's patience is running out. Ask him or her to think of something that took a long time to learn, like riding a bike or swimming. Then ask: "Now that you've accomplished that goal, was it worth the wait?" Inevitably, the answer is "yes," and the value of being patient is appreciated.

Children come into this world filled with infinite possibilities, but some fail to tap into their potential because they lack encouragement from the significant adults in their lives.

Every parent, as well as other adults who interact with children, can play a vital role in helping unleash that potential. ○

Today *garble* refers mostly to what we do with language such as song lyrics or lines of spoken poetry, *We sift through* words that are misunderstood and create meaningless phrases that are later thrown away. ○


