The origins of April Fools' Day are obscure. The predominant theory holds that



Program Review

JPL to send a Robot to Traverse the Sands of Mars and a Helicopter to do a Flyover



ne of the benefits of being part of the Rotary Club of Altadena is the close proximity to Jet

Propulsion Laboratory (JPL). A number of club members have been employed by JPL

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as scientists, astronomers, and engineers. In addition, many of the scientists and others have made presentations to the club on the various projects and programs that are being pursued at JPL. This last Thursday afternoon was one of those programs.

Our speaker was Humphrey (Hoppy) Price. Price is the chief engineer of NASA's Robotic Mars Exploration Program. He has had many assignments in his career at JPL. He was the architect of the JPL minimal architecture for humans to Mars. He has led and participated in many formulation studies of spacecraft and advanced propulsion systems, including the Mars Sample Return, interstellar missions, solar sails and fusion rockets.

According to Price, the planet Mars is over 3 billion years old, and is similar to earth in size and geography. It has moons, and seasons. It has days and nights. It has many caves. Because of its similarity to earth and its proximity to earth, there has been much interest in sending missions to Mars and bringing back samples to earth for study and research.

The Mars Sample Return is a proposed mission to return samples from the surface of Mars to Earth. The mission would use

robotic systems and a Mars ascent rocket to collect and send samples of Martian rocks, soils and atmosphere to Earth for detailed chemical and physical analysis. The Mars 2020 Mission will involve the sending of a robotic rover which will gather samples from rocks and soil using its drill. After a sample is collected it will be placed in a special tube. The sample tube is then transferred back inside the belly of the rover. The tube is then sealed, at which point nothing can leave or enter the tube. The tubes are

Rotoractors reshape Refugee Camp



After fleeing conflict in their own countries, a group of young Rotaractors is healing wounds and bringing cultures together in a Ugandan refugee settlement ... By Jonathan W. Rosen; Produced by Kate

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Tt's Monday morning in one of Uganda's largest refugee settlements, Nakivale, and the line at Paul Mushaho's shop is out the door.



Paul Mushaho organized a team of volunteers and formed a Rotaract club in Nakivale, Uganda, to give refugees something constructive to do.

Mushaho has lived in Nakivale since 2016, when he fled violence in his native Democratic Republic of Congo. After receiving death threats, he crossed into Uganda and joined a friend in the 184-square-kilometer settlement that serves as home to 89,000 people.

The soft-spoken 26-year-old, who has a university degree in information technology, runs a money transfer service out of a wooden storefront that doubles as his home.

Business is booming because he offers his clients – other refugees from Congo, Burundi, Somalia, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Rwanda, and South Sudan – the ability to receive money via mobile phone from family and friends outside Uganda.

He also exchanges currency, and his shop is so popular that he often runs out of cash. On this day, he's waiting for a friend to return with more money from the nearest bank, two hours away in the town of Mbarara.

Sitting behind a wooden desk, armed

with his transactions ledger and seven cell phones, Mushaho grows anxious. He's not worried about missing out on commission ... he's worried about leaving his clients without any money.

"I don't like making my customers wait," he says, looking out onto the lively street of tin-roofed stores, women selling tomatoes and charcoal, a butcher shop displaying a leg of beef, and young men loitering on

motorcycles. "There's nobody else around who they can go to."

As a young entrepreneur who is intent on improving the lives of others in his community, Mushaho is in many ways the

quintessential member of Rotaract, the Rotary-sponsored organization for leaders ages 18 to 30.

Yet his story and that of his club are far from ordinary. Established in late 2016, and officially inaugurated last July, the Rotaract Club of Nakivale may be the first Rotaract club based inside a refugee settlement or camp.

Its founding, and the role it has played in the lives of its members and their fellow Nakivale residents, is a tale of young people who've refused to let conflict stifle their dreams; of a country that sees the humanity in all the refugees who cross its borders; and of a spirit of service that endures, even among those who've experienced unspeakable tragedy.

it dates from about 1582, the year France adopted the Gregorian Calendar, which switched the beginning of the year from what is now the end of March (around the time of the vernal equinox) to the first of January. According to popular lore, some folks, out of ignorance, stubbornness, or both, continued to ring in the New Year on April first and were made the butt of jokes and pranks ("poissons d'avril," or "April Fish") on account of their foolishness. This became an annual celebration which ultimately spread throughout Europe and other parts of the world. However, the earliest known historical reference to April Fools' Day occurs in a Dutch poem published in 1561, which predates the adoption of the Gregorian calendar by some 21 years.

> A couple of famous pranks involved the BBC: The Great Spaghetti Harvest

One of the great media hoaxes of all

time was perpetrated on April 1, 1957 by the BBC, which reported on its news program Panorama that Switzerland was experiencing a bumper spaghetti harvest that year, thanks to favorable weather and the

elimination of the dread *spagbetti weevil*. Staged video footage showing happy peasants plucking strands of pasta from tall trees was so convincing that many viewers actually called the network to ask how they could grow their own.



On April 1, 1976, famed British astronomer and radio presenter Patrick Moore announced over the BBC that a rare alignment of the planets Pluto and Jupiter would occur at exactly 9:47 am, during which the effects

of gravity would be nullified and everyone on earth would feel weightless for a brief moment. "At 9:47, Moore declared, 'Jump now!" writes Alex Boese of the Museum of Hoaxes. "A minute passed, and then the BBC switch-

board lit up with dozens of people calling in to report that the experiment had worked!" But it was all a complete prank, of course, one of the most famous in history.

Whether you fooled, or were fooled, I hope the levity of the day can prevail throughout the month ... and do look up *The Great Spaghetti Hoax* on YouTube when you get the chance!

stored until the NASA team decides the time and place to drop the samples off on the surface. The spot of droop-off is called the "sample cache depot." The depots will be well-documented with precise coordinates. The samples will eventually be retrieved by another mission for return to earth for analysis.

Part of the Mars 2020 program is the development of a special helicopter which will be firmly nestled under the belly of the Mars 2020 rover. The helicopter weighs no more than 4 pounds and is intended to go where the rover cannot go. One challenge to the development of the helicopter is that the Martian surface atmosphere is only one percent of the density of Earth's surface atmosphere. That is the equivalent of 100,000 feet above the Earth. Another challenge is

that the gravity on Mars is much weaker than that of Earth - only 1/3 of Earth's gravity. To test the helicopter, NASA is simulating the Mars atmosphere and gravity within a vacuum chamber.

The Mars 2020 rover - along with



the Mars Helicopter — will launch on a United Launch Alliance Atlas V rocket in July 2020 from Cape Canaveral. It is expected to

reach Mars in February 2021, approximately 7 months after launch.


