Megan Tunnell O'Rourke is President of BTI Appraisal, a full service appraisal company started by her father, Ben Tunnell, in 1974.

A Los Angeles native, she attended Marlborough School, earned a BA in English from the University of Southern California and graduated *Magna cum Laude* and *Order of the Coif* from Loyola Law School. Megan started her legal career at Gibson, Dunn & Crutcher, LLP in their Downtown LA office where she practiced in the real estate and corporate law departments, before joining BTI in 2003.

O'Rourke is a member of the Jonathan Club and very active in her community. She has served on the Board of Governors for Loyola Law School, the Advisory Board for the Neighborhood Academic Initiative at USC and, in 2011, became the youngest President in the history of the Rotary Club of Los Angeles, the fifth oldest Rotary club in the world.

A Road to Full Nutrition for the World



The program this past week was the craft talk by Sonia Kwon. Starting at the beginning, she told us that she was born in Ohio. She described herself as an *80s baby*. As a child, she lived in several different States as new job opportunities opened up for her father as a research scientist. In the course of his profession in the study of food products,

Kwon's father obtained 13 US patents. Pretty darn impressive. You may recall that her dad, Dr. Steven Kwon, spoke to our Club in June of this year. Sonia's mother is an artist, specializing in large abstract paintings in oil. Her mother is also a professor who has taught fine arts when they lived in Connecticut and in other States, as well as at various colleges in California, including PCC.

Kwon eventually moved with her parents to Pasadena, where she attended La Salle High School for a time. She went on to attend UC Davis for undergraduate studies. Then, after a visit to Afghanistan in 2007, she was inspired to enroll in graduate studies at the School of Public Health at Boston University. Among her earlier jobs, Kwon worked for councilman Jack Weiss in the 5th District of LA, where she was the field representative of the Hollywood Hills area.

She later joined the non-profit company that her father had founded in 2003 called – Nutrition and Education International (NEI). The company is headquartered in Pasadena, but also has offices in South Korea and Afghanistan. Kwon was named Director of Programs and Operations for NEI. Her father began visiting Afghanistan – considered to have the most malnourished population in the world – at 54 percent of the total population and with 36.6 percent of the children considered to have chronic malnutrition. Her father set as a goal for



NEI to create a soy food industry run by the Afghans themselves, as a self-sustainable solution to malnutrition in the country and as part of a United Nations' *Sustainable Development Goal #2* to end world hunger by 2030.

Compounding the malnutrition problem, Afghanistan is one of the most dangerous countries in the world, having undergone forty years of war which still continues. To get the job done, NEI has had to acquire and maintain the cooperation of the Afghan

government as well as the Taliban, which as you may guess, is quite a challenge. The NEI program in Afghanistan has 4 components:

- Soybean seed selection;
- Soybean farming;
- Soybean food processing; and
- Soybean marketing.

They first select the soybean varieties that will appeal to the pallet of Afghan citizens. Then they have to train the farmers in growing this new crop so there will be a successful harvest – they have determined that 300,000 metric tons of Soybeans will be needed each year to cover the entire country. Then they have to teach the citi-

zens how to incorporate the soybeans into food they are already consuming. Finally, they have to train the appropriate business people in Afghanistan how to market the product so citizens will buy it and cook it.

Although it is challenging, it has been well received by the Afghan government and the people. As Sonia Kwon says, "Although there are many pros and cons, there are more pros than cons. Now other governments e.g., the Philippines, Tanzania and Kenya have shown an interest in adopting the NEI model.

We all wish you the best in this very worthwhile worldwide program. ○
