1949, while the Guild was founded in 1951. Our club meets weekly, while the Guild meets monthly. And, more importantly, both organizations are dedicated to community service. The primary purpose of the Guild is to support both Huntington Hospital and the Huntington Medical Research Institute (HMRI). Currently, the hospital is building a brand new cardiac center to make it easier for heart patients to access care.

The volunteer time put in by the Guild last year equated to \$130.314 in donated dollars. There are now 50 members of the Guild currently volunteering at the hospital.

Building a Better World



t Altadena Rotary, we are well blessed to be able to help our community and other clubs two ways:

- With a donation
- Actual work

Soon a Hospital for Mirge, Nepal

Our Rotary Club just recently sent \$5,000 to the Rotary Club of Wollaton Park in Nottingham England. This is our second year in a row with a donation of this size. The Wollaton Park Club is the home of our Past President Sarah O'Brien. The funds will again be used toward the construction of a 15-bed hospital in Mirge, Nepal. Mirge is

a remote village with no electricity, a day's drive from Kathmandu and then a five-hour walk up the mountain.

A couple of years earlier, the Wollaton Park Club helped to build a small medical aid station, but that has turned out not to be enough. Thus, the pledge that the Altadena Rotary Club has made to help fast track the 15-bed hospital. Ground breaking occurred earlier this year. We hope that soon in the future, some of our Club members can find some personal time and go and visit to see first-hand how our funds are making a difference.

Super Build

It is now time to talk about Super Build — Rotary working with Corozon.org to build homes just south of the border in Tecate Mexico. Our club has allocated funds that will allow our members to receive a stipend

of \$200 to participate. This will help with some of the expenses of gas, transportation and one night's lodging.

Rotary District 5300 actually has two *builds* during our Rotary year: One on November 2, 2019 to build one home and another on May 17, 2020 where we hope to be building 2-3 homes based on District 5300 Clubs financial commitment!

If you are interested in the *build* coming up, please sign up under District 5300 on the Corazon.org website for November 2, 2019.

This Build includes transportation to the Mexico site by bus only. There will be no separate cars allowed on this build across the border. The cost for transportation is \$30 round trip per each volunteer. There is a cut-off at 45 volunteers, and there are currently 25 signed up.

new building that has been already paid off. Along with other institutions, they are on the cutting edge of major breakthrough biomedical research.

The Guild's major fundraiser is the home tours that they conduct on the first Sunday in May. These tours yield a profit of \$80,000 annually. They've been conducting these tours since 1951. Last year's street was Midwick Drive, and included the home of Altadena Rotary member Mike Zoeller. Each year, the Guild selects a street to

be featured on the tour, with four or five moderately sized homes. They stage the homes with flowers, some furniture, and some gardening.

Last year, the Guild donated 5,278 hours to the hospital for a total value of \$130,313, 7,490 hours to non-hospital entities, for a total of \$184,977, and direct donations of \$100,000. This organization continues to be a driving force in the community for both Huntington Hospital and the HMRI.


